

Consejos Para Padres ~ Parenting Tips

The benefits of bilingualism for children and adults continue to be proven in research with advantages ranging from cultural connections, enhanced cultural awareness, higher academic achievement scores, and reduced incidence of dementia and Alzheimer's. You can introduce [multiple languages to your child](#) from an early age. Whether you practice the one-parent, one-language approach or the language location approach (speaking a specific language in specific locations, i.e. Spanish at home and English outside the home), it can help by building specific times into your schedule to speak the target language. If you have multiple languages to offer your child, designate specific routines or times to be done in the target language. Try bath time in Spanish. Sort and fold laundry in Japanese. Empty the dishwasher in Arabic. Then always do that routine, every time, in the target language.

Offering opportunities for your child to demonstrate success and exert their independence, such as by offering limited choices, and allowing your child to choose how they would like to help. By involving your child in ritualized chores, such as laundry (ages 12 months and up), toy pick-up (ages 6 months and up), assisting with toileting (age 12 months and up), dishes (ages 3 and up), food prep (30 months), or picking out their own clothes and getting dressed you can also use these times to build vocabulary and your relationship with your child in the target language.
